Kokyo (Imperial Palace) Gaien National Garden

Created in 1949 when part of the grounds of the former Imperial Palace was opened to the public as a national park, the garden is made up of the Kokyo Gaien centered on the Imperial Palace Plaza, the Kitanomaru Garden, to the north, and the moats surrounding the Imperial Palace.

The Garden is an ideal place for a leisurely stroll or picnic lunch, and is

recommended for small children.

Each season offers its own delights, making the park enjoyable year-round.




Much of its natural heritage has been preserved over this long history, making the park rich in biodiversity.
